### **TUSKEGEE UNIVERSITY HISTORY**

Marked by more than a century of tradition since its founding through the efforts of former slave Lewis Adams and former slave owner George W. Campbell, Tuskegee University today is known for being among the nation's premier historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) — and for its openness to all. Its mission remains service to people, not merely education for its own sake. Stressing the need to educate the whole person, that is, the hand and the heart as well as the mind, founding principal Booker T. Washington's new school was soon acclaimed — first by Alabama and then by the nation — for the soundness and vigor of its educational programs and principles.

Founded as the Tuskegee Normal School for Colored Teachers through the passage of Alabama House Bill 165 on July 4, 1881, Tuskegee University traces its modest beginnings to a oneroom shanty located near Butler's Chapel AME Zion Church. Under Washington's leadership, however, the Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute (as of 1893) soon rose to national prominence. A highly skilled organizer and fundraiser who counseled U.S. presidents, Washington was a strong advocate of black farmers and businesses. Student enrollment was not limited to rural Macon County and the South, but was global in composition. Every student's educational experience combined vocational classes with coursework toward general diplomas, which included mathematics, English and history. To that end, Washington recruited the best and brightest available within the black community, including famed researcher George Washington Carver and architect Robert R. Taylor.

Tuskegee's prominence as a black school of higher learning continued after Washington's passing in 1915. President Robert R. Moton actively solicited for modern buildings and equipment to teach the trades, more comfortable faculty and student housing, and enlarged and improved recreational, health and academic facilities. By 1927, his efforts had helped to elevate Tuskegee's high school-level academics to full four-year college status with bachelor degrees in agriculture, home economics, mechanical industries and education. In addition, it donated land in 1923 for the Tuskegee Veteran's Administration Hospital — the first and only one staffed by black professionals. He continued institutional relationships with financiers such as Julius Rosenwald, which in turn created programs for underprivileged portions of society and the education of blacks.

Tuskegee would establish itself as a leader in veterinary medicine education in 1944 when President Frederick D. Patterson founded the Tuskegee Institute (as of 1937) School of Veterinary Medicine. In the same year, he helped co-found the United Negro College Fund, which continues today to advocate on behalf of and provide financial support for a consortium of HBCUs — Tuskegee among them.

During the 1940s, although the rest of the world was embroiled in war, Tuskegee continued to better opportunities for blacks nationwide. The Infantile Paralysis Center, which opened on Jan. 15, 1941, as part of Tuskegee University's John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital, treated and served African-American patients (especially for polio) from the southeastern states, as well as Alabama patients with other orthopedic conditions. Further acclaim resulted from the university's Civilian Pilot Training Program (which began in 1939) that eventually led to the formation of the 99th Fighter Squadron of Tuskegee Airmen in June 1941.

The organization of the College of Arts and Sciences, the elimination of several vocational programs, and the development of engineering programs marked the tenure of fourth president, Dr. Luther H. Foster. His tenure also included the turbulent years of the Civil Rights Movement, during which time the university maintained an attitude of open dialogue by allowing a variety of controversial speakers — such as Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, Stokely Carmichael, Julian Bond and Alex Haley — to visit campus. In 1960, Arts and Sciences Dean Charles Gomillion filed a lawsuit leading to the groundbreaking Supreme Court case Gomillion vs. Lightfoot concerning Tuskegee's black citizens who had been illegally gerrymandered out of their right to vote. Tragically, on Jan. 3, 1966, Tuskegee freshman Samuel Younge Jr. became the first black college student killed as a result of his involvement in the civil rights movement. The university's significance in our nation's history has twice been celebrated by the U.S. Department of the Interior's National Parks Service: first, in 1966, when it became the first HBCU designated as a Registered National Historic Landmark; and again in 1974, when it became the nation's only HBCU designated as a National Historic Site.

Through fifth president Dr. Benjamin F. Payton's participation on the Tuskegee Syphilis Study Legacy Committee, the university established the National Center for Bioethics in Research and Health Care as part of the government's apology for its participation in the "U.S. Public Health Service Study on Syphilis" conducted at Tuskegee from 1932 to 1972. Payton's commitment to education was further exemplified when, in 1985, Tuskegee attained university status and began offering its first doctoral programs in integrative biosciences, materials science and engineering.

The decade following Payton's presidency — under the leadership of presidents Gilbert L. Rochon and Brian L. Johnson — marked a greater emphasis on Tuskegee's research capacity and physical campus through the construction of new education, science and residential halls, as well as improvements to existing facilities. Each also contributed significantly to broader integration of arts and cultural programs in the growing STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) movement throughout the U.S.

On July 1, 2018, Tuskegee University marked a new leadership milestone as Dr. Lily D. McNair began her tenure as its eighth – and first female – president in 137 years. Currently, Tuskegee University is under the leadership of its ninth and second female president, Dr. Charlotte P. Morris, who began her tenure on August 1, 2021.

# Commencement Speaker MICHELE WISE WRIGHT, Ph.D. '90

Senior Executive Leader & American Inventor



Michele Wise Wright, Ph.D. is Arkansas's 2022 USA TODAY Woman of the Year. A native of Tuskegee, Alabama, and Tuskegee University alumna, she is the recipient of the Nations of Women Change Makers 2021 Global Leadership Award and a nominee of the EveryLife Foundation of Rare Diseases' RareVoice 2021 Award for Diversity Empowerment. She is also the writer, director, and producer of the 2022 Black Reels Awards and multiple global award-winning docudrama, "54 YEARS LATE".

Dr. Wright is a multi-dimensional Senior Executive with experience providing dynamic leadership in diverse roles, including pharmaceutical/biotechnology sales, healthcare administration, and business development to Fortune 100 companies and an international non-profit organization. She is the CEO and Founder of My Water Buddy® and My Learning Buddy® corporations.

With advanced degrees in engineering and public policy, she is fully committed to diversity and inclusion, emphasizing health equity. She has championed a diverse range of health equity initiatives as the Co-Founder, Board Chair, and Senior Executive Director of the National

Organization of African Americans with Cystic Fibrosis (NOAACF).

Through widespread involvement, partnerships, engagement, and outreach, under her leadership, NOAACF has strategically helped to ensure that communities of people who are Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) are well informed of cystic fibrosis (CF) 's existence, prevalence, and impact on underrepresented communities. Dr. Wright co-founded and co-chaired the annual Blacks, Indigenous, and Other Minority Ethnicities with Rare and Genetic Diseases (BIOMERGD) Conference. A yearly event hosted by NOAACF that coincides with Rare Disease Day and Black History Month, with a mission to help increase awareness of rare diseases in BIPOC communities by focusing on one genetic illness and one rare disease each year.

She also created and led the national development of The Wright Cystic Fibrosis Screening Tool© - in both patient and provider versions and English and Spanish translations – to help people self-identify symptoms that could be related to CF, as well as help medical providers, identify people who may have CF, especially those who are BIPOC.

Simultaneously, Dr. Wright developed and launched the Advocating for Health Equity and Addressing Disparities© (AHEAD) Initiative with a mission to increase awareness of health disparities in minority and underserved communities and to introduce a successful roadmap and advancement strategies toward achieving health equity in healthcare, clinical treatment, medical diagnosis, and clinical trials across a multitude of disadvantaged populations.

She is a national and international multiple award-winning corporate leader who has worked with several top-ranked corporations, including Genentech Biotechnology Company, Novartis Pharmaceuticals, Pfizer Pharmaceuticals, and The Procter & Gamble Company. She also has served with the American Red Cross as Chief Executive Officer of the Greater Ozarks-Arkansas Region (GOAR).

Dr. Wright holds a Ph.D. in Public Policy from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, with a double specialization in Health and Leadership Policy; a Master of Science degree from the University of Tennessee Space Institute (UTSI), where she chartered the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) and was UTSI's first African-American full-time student to earn a Master's degree in Engineering Management/Industrial Engineering. She also holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering from Tuskegee University, where she was Miss United Negro College Fund, Miss Engineering, President of the Engineering Representative Council, and graduated as Electrical Engineering Student of the Year.

Her life mantra is "The Best Is Yet to Come." She plans to extend towards helping and positively impacting children, women, and underrepresented populations worldwide. Dr. Wright and her husband, Terry Wright, reside in North Little Rock, Arkansas.

## Commencement Speaker

### DAVID K. WILSON, ED.D. '77, '79

President, Morgan State University



David K. Wilson, Ed.D., the 10th president of Morgan State University, has a long record of accomplishment and more than 30 years of experience in higher education administration. Dr. Wilson holds four academic degrees: a B.S. in political science and an M.S. in education from Tuskegee University; an Ed.M. in educational planning and administration from Harvard University and an Ed.D. in administration, planning and social policy, also from Harvard. He came to Morgan from the University of Wisconsin, where he was chancellor of both the University of Wisconsin Colleges and the University of Wisconsin–Extension. Before that, he held numerous other administrative posts in academia, including: vice president for University Outreach and associate provost at Auburn University, and associate provost of Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey.

Dr. Wilson's tenure as Morgan's president, which began on July 1, 2010, has been characterized by great gains and a momentum of progress for the University. Under his leadership, included among the most recent highlights are:

- The elevation of Morgan from a moderate research classification of R3 (a ranking it has held since 2006), to an elevated classification of R2, a status reserved for doctoral universities with high research activity;
- A second-year retention rate of above 70 percent for the past eight consecutive years;
- An alumni participation-in-giving rate of 17 percent, a rate higher than most private HBCUs and higher than many public regional universities nationwide;
- The highest graduation rate in 10 years at 43 percent, trending toward achieving a 50 percent graduation rate by the year 2025; The historic completion of the University's \$250 Million Anniversary Campaign, the largest development effort in Morgan's history;
- Procurement of the university's largest-ever research contract, a \$28.5-million, five-year contract from NASA;
- The founding of a new school, the School of Global Journalism and Communication;
- The construction and planned construction of multiple state-of-the-art facilities including Tyler Hall Student Service Building, Martin D. Jenkins Hall, Morgan Business Center, Northwood Commons and new health and human services building; and
- The continuation of Morgan's status as the No. 1 HBCU in production of Fulbright scholars and grantees, with 149 awarded in 44 countries around the world.

Dr. Wilson has authored two books and more than 20 articles published in scholarly journals. Among the many honors and recognitions he has received for his work: he was named one of the nation's top 100 leaders in higher education by the American Association of Higher Education in 1998, was selected as one of The Daily Record newspaper's Influential Marylanders for 2011, and was honored by the University of Alabama with an award for outstanding leadership in engaged scholarship in April 2011.

In April 2019, Dr. Wilson was appointed to serve on the NCAA Board of Governors and Division I Board of Directors, and in 2018, the Lumina Foundation elected Dr. Wilson to serve on its Board of Directors. Prior to this election, the U.S Under Secretary of Commerce for Standards and Technology had appointed him to serve a three-year term as a member of the National Institute of Standards and Technology's (NIST's) Visiting Committee on Advanced Technology. He is a former chairman of the HBCU/China Network, a member of the Maryland Cybersecurity Council and the Maryland Longitudinal Data System Governing Board and serves on the Boards of Directors of the Greater Baltimore Committee, the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities and the Association of American Colleges and Universities. In 2010, former President Barack Obama appointed him to his 11-member Board of Advisors on Historically Black Colleges and Universities. Dr. Wilson served on the Board of United Way of Central Maryland.

Dr. Wilson's achievements as leader of Maryland's Preeminent Public Urban Research University have clearly been strong, but it is the character he brings to the presidency, a character shaped by the intangibles of his background, that is perhaps most impressive of all. Dr. Wilson grew up with 10 siblings on a sharecropper farm outside the small town of McKinley, Ala. Through hard work, tenacity and the encouragement of his father and his teachers, he became the first person in his family to attend college. Dr. Wilson builds upon that legacy as the proud father of Nyere Brown Wilson, a current student majoring in business administration at Morgan.

Dr. Wilson's educational philosophy is to put the students' experience first. As a leader, he is a consensus builder and a strong believer in transparency of process. His goal is to make Morgan a leader in producing the next wave of innovators in the U.S.

### CHARLOTTE P. MORRIS, Ph.D.

President



Dr. Charlotte P. Morris began her current tenure as Tuskegee University's 9th president on August 1, 2021. Her 30-plus-year tenure at Tuskegee has included numerous leadership and faculty appointments at the college and university levels. Her most recent prior appointment on November 1, 2020, as interim president was her third appointment to the university's top post—the first having been in 2010 following the retirement of President Benjamin F. Payton.

Morris began her tenure at Tuskegee University in 1984 as a faculty member of the now Andrew F. Brimmer College of Business and Information Science. In 1987, she began serving as executive associate/chief of staff to the university president and secretary to the university's Board of Trustees — duties she faithfully performed for 23 years. During the last eight years in that position, she also served as the director of the university's Title III program and as chair of the university's Convocations

and Special Events Committee. After concluding her first appointment as interim president, Morris returned to the Brimmer College, where she served as associate dean and professor of management — until appointed as the college's interim dean in 2016 upon the retirement of Dean Tejinder Sara.

Morris' early career experience includes teaching appointments at Trenholm State Community College and Kansas State University. Other higher education experience includes serving as program associate for planning, management, and evaluation at Mississippi Valley State University. In 2011, she was appointed by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges as a visiting peer review team member. She is also a member of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Education Foundation and the Alabama School of Cyber Technology and Engineering.

A native of Kosciusko, Mississippi, Morris completed a bachelor's degree in business education at Jackson State University, a master's degree in business administration and management at Delta State University, and a Ph.D. degree in education and business management from Kansas State University. She has completed additional graduate-level coursework at the Harvard University Graduate School of Education's Institute for Educational Management, higher education administration coursework at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale, and summer institutes in curriculum development in higher education.

A resident of Montgomery, Alabama, since 1983, Morris is a Golden Life Member of the Montgomery Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., a member and former president of the Agnes J. Lewis Women's Club, and a member of the Lilly Missionary Baptist Church, where she serves on the usher board, as a Sunday School teacher, and as a member of the missions' circle. Additionally, she holds/has held membership in the Society for Human Resources Management (SHRM), Beta Gamma Sigma National Honor Society in Business, the Golden Key National Honor Society, the National Council of Negro Women, and the American Council on Education.

Among Morris' accolades are membership in Leadership Montgomery's Class XXIX, Tuskegee University's Distinguished Administrative Staff Achievement Award, Bush Foundation Fellow, Service Award from the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, and inclusion in the 1992 edition of Who's Who Worldwide. Upon completion of undergraduate studies, she received the "I Dare You" Award for leadership qualities.

Morris was married to the late Dr. William R. Morris and is the parent of one adult son.



### Academic Heraldry

In a tradition passed down from the Middle Ages, academic regalia worn during commencements symbolize the essence of educational pageantry. Academic dress originated during the 12th and 13th centuries with the establishment of European universities. By the second half of the 14th century, England began defining academic dress.

The long gowns and hoods may have been necessary for warmth in medieval buildings. As the statutes evolved, the traditional English costumes were incorporated into American colleges and universities in the 19th century. Rapid growth of those institutions in the United States led to a standardized assignment of colors for the various fields of learning.

Representatives of major institutions formed an intercollegiate commission to establish a suitable academic code of dress. The commission met at Columbia University in 1895 and adopted the Intercollegiate Code, which regulates the cut, style, colors and materials for each part of the academic costume to be used for bachelor's, master's and doctoral levels. The code was revised in 1932 by the American Council on Education and again by a committee appointed by ACE in 1959. The code was updated most recently in 1986.

### Gowns

Materials, trimmings and sleeves of gowns vary by discipline. Black is the recommended color. Gowns for bachelor's or master's degrees are untrimmed. The sleeves of the bachelor's degree gown, which is always worn closed, are pointed. The master's degree gown has oblong sleeves that are open at the wrist. The doctoral degree gown features velvet facing down the front and three bars of velvet across the bell-shaped sleeves. The velvet trimmings may be black or the color distinctive of the degree's discipline. Master's and doctoral gowns may be worn open or closed.

### Hoods

As the academic costume's most distinctive feature, hoods must be black and made of the same material as the gown. The hood identifies both the degree level and the institution conferring the degree. The length of the hood worn for the bachelor's degree must be three feet; for the master's degree, three and one-half feet; and for the doctoral degree, which may have panels at the sides, four feet. Lined with the official colors of the college or university conferring the degree, only the highest degree is represented on the hood. The color of the velvet edging indicates the subject to which the degree pertains and measures three inches for the master's degree and five inches for the doctoral degree.

### Cap

The square black mortarboard is recommended, and the material may be cotton poplin, broadcloth, rayon or silk to match the gown. Doctoral degree caps may be velvet with gold tassels. Tassels, which should be black or the color appropriate to the subject, should be fastened to the middle point of the top of the cap only and lie as it will.

Other colors may be seen in the procession.

### Important Terms to Remember

**alma mater** - A term that may be used when referring to Tuskegee University, the university from which you graduated. **alumna** - Use this singular term for a female graduate.

**alumnae** - Use this plural term for a group of female graduates.

**alumni** - Use this plural term for former students or graduates, whether referring to a group of males or a group consisting of males and females. This term should never be used in reference to a single individual.

**alumnus** - Use this singular term for a male graduate.

**TNAA** - Acronym for the Tuskegee National Alumni Association, Inc.
